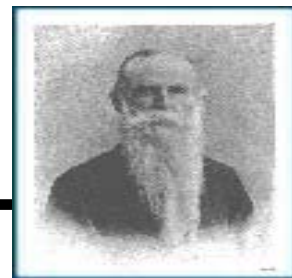

CONFEDERATE ANCESTOR

One of our newest members, Wayne Tebbutt, is the descendant of Pvt. Benjamin Hale. On May 4, 2002 members of the Col's. Lewis & Harrison Camp held a memorial service and dedication of Pvt Hales' Confederate headstone. Below is the article from the Sabetha Star Newspaper about the ceremony. (Notice the relationship between our ancestors who fought for our freedoms in the Revolutionary War and our ancestors who also fought for our freedoms in the War Between the States.)

"Burial sites of Civil War veterans are not particularly uncommon in the Sabetha area and surrounding communities. But in the case of Benjamin M. Hale, the fact that he was a Confederate

soldier makes his final resting place somewhat unique in this area.

Also, it was not until recently that his grave, located at Capioma Cemetery, was marked. Approximately 40 people, including about 15 of Hale's descendents, gathered on Saturday, May 4 at the Capioma Cemetery to dedicate a memorial to Hale.

All of this came about because fourth cousins Donna Brockish of St. Mary's and Bonnie Feldhausen (Wayne's sister) of Frankfort have been tracing their family trees over many years. Because their great grandfathers had married sisters, this resulted in extensive research into the family lineage from several directions.

Their hard work and research yielded results and at this point, they have traced the Hale family back to England as early as 1632.

As many early settlers of the new world, the American Hales settled in Virginia under the direction of patriarch Lewis Hale.

This historical record indicates that Lewis Hale fought in the Revolutionary War with distinction, having fought the battle at King's Mountain and at the Battle of Guilford Court House. Also, it would appear from Grayson County, Virginia documents that Hale also participated in battles against the Indians.

A monument was recently placed at the gravesite of Benjamin Hale in the Capioma Cemetery. Hale, a Confederate veteran who died in 1896, was the postmaster at Discord, Kansas, in 1874. Records indicate that Lewis Hale died on July 2, 1802 and was buried in an unmarked grave near his Virginia home. It was 100 years later, on July 2, 1902, that a monument was erected marking Hale's final resting place.

The record indicates that Benjamin Hale, Born in 1825 in Virginia, was the grandson of Lewis Hale. He and his wife moved and settled in Tennessee. The exact date of that move has not been determined.

However, it is certain from Confederate documents that Hale enlisted for military duty in the D 36 Tennessee Infantry on December 17, 1861. However, it is also indicated that Confederate records 'are not very good' and it is not known when Hale was mustered out of service.

In about 1868 Benjamin Hale moved his family to Macon County, Ill. near Decatur. The year they moved to Kansas is also not known, but Benjamin was listed with the U.S. Indian Agencies as a blacksmith in Kansas in 1877 through 1879.

Records show that he also was the postmaster at Discord, Kansas in 1874. Discord later became known as Comet.

According to records submitted by Mary Steinlage of Kelly, Comet was located about five miles west of Powhattan, near the current location of U.S. Highway 75.

Brockish and Feldhausen determined from Nemaha County cemetery records that Benjamin Hale died on April 18, 1896 and was buried in an unmarked grave at Capioma Cemetery.

Shortly after Brockish and Feldhausen discovered that Benjamin and his wife and some Hale children were buried at the Capioma Cemetery, they visited the site. Both said they were disappointed to find that neither grave was marked. However, the location of markers of some of the children indicated the area where Benjamin and Sophia Hale were buried.

With help, they were able to determine with fair certainty the

exact location of the graves.

Years passed and during these years, the sisters wanted to make certain that appropriate monuments were erected for the Hales.

On August 9, 2001, Brockish said she contacted Kyle Erickson of Topeka with the Sons of Confederate Veterans organization.

With his help and help from the Veterans Administration, the family was able to secure a proper monument for Benjamin's grave.

The marker was recently erected and a formal ceremony dedicating the monument, and attended by numerous descendants, was held on a typical Kansas spring day at Capioma Cemetery.

Sons of Confederate Veterans representatives read a dedication and with a gun salute bid farewell to a comrade of the of Confederacy"

DIXIE

Below are some little known facts about the song "Dixie" from "How to Love Yankees"

- Dixie was written in 1859 in New York City
- The man who wrote it, Dan Emmett, was from Ohio
- Emmett also wrote, "Turkey in the Straw" and "Blue Tailed Fly".
- At the age of fifteen he wrote "Old Dan Tucker," using his own name (Dan) and that of his old dog (Tucker).
- Emmett was, himself, a true Union man.

- The original first verse was discarded because Emmett's wife disliked it for the irreverence (in her eyes).
- At Union President Lincoln's Inaugural Ball the night of March 4, 1861, the music for the Lincoln Grand march was none other than Daniel Emmett's "Dixie."
- According to the New York Times of March 5, 1861, "Patriotic airs were generally played... Dixie was a great favorite."

- On April 8, 1865, after having paid a visit to battered and burned-out Petersburg, Virginia, Lincoln and his party were saying goodbye to the war zone. Steaming up the Potomac River aboard the Riverboat Queen, Lincoln was asked by the leader of the military band aboard what numbers he would like to hear and he requested "The Marseilles" and "Dixie. They were his last requests.
